

Alessandra Mussolini hits back at Libya

Dictator Mussolini's granddaughter says Libyans would still be on 'camels' if it hadn't been for her grandfather.

ROME - Italian MEP Alessandra Mussolini stoked an increasingly bitter row with Libya on Friday, saying its people would still be riding camels if the country had not been occupied by fascist forces under her grandfather, dictator Benito Mussolini.

Mussolini was speaking after Libyan leader Moamer Kadhafi threatened further attacks on Italians if Tripoli's compensation claim for decades of colonisation remained unheeded.

"If it hadn't been for my grandfather they would still be riding camels with turbans on their heads," said Mussolini, whose far-right political group has signed a pre-election pact with Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi ahead of April 9 polls.

"They are the ones who should be paying us compensation, because it was a positive colonisation. Fascism exported democracy, as well as roads, houses and schools," she said.

Libyan rioters razed the Italian consulate in Benghazi on February 17, ostensibly over an Italian minister wearing a Tshirt satirising the Prophet Mohammed.

Carried Contract

Kadhafi said in a televised speech on Thursday that while the violence was regrettable, it was a result of the "accumulated wrongs since 1911, of repression and injustice suffered by the Libyan people under Italian occupation."

He called on Italy to "compensate the Libyan people for the deaths and refugees (of the colonial period), to avoid a (social) explosion against its interests, its companies and its nationals."

Italy had already occupied Libya for more than a decade before Mussolini came to power in 1922.
